Introduction of forest school. (MA/LD/SC)	Children are able to lead their own learning. They will receive 2 hours of forest schooling per week (starting with Year 1 children). Rotate children ever 6 weeks so all children access this. Being outdoors boosts their wellbeing and they are given time to learn, explore and connect with nature. They are provided with a range of speaking and listening opportunities and learn to self-regulate and manage their own feelings and emotions. Staff take the time to learn from the Forest School Lead and use the Leuven Scale to gauge wellbeing of their children.
