This term, Year 2 are going to be using their enquiry skills to find out about the Arctic region so they can answer our key enguiry question, 'Would you like to live on top of the world?' Through studying the landscape, the people (including the indigenous population), weather patterns and the animals found here, the children will be able to make links and draw comparisons with their own locality. As part of this study, the children will learn about the different countries found in the Arctic and they will carry out a study of Greenland, focusing upon both its physical and human geography. We will be making lots of crosscurricular links, including examining polar animals and their habitats in science, discussing key environmental issues in PSHE and writing poetry and non-fiction texts in English, linked to one of the most magical places on earth. Please use this Knowledge Organiser as a means of engaging your child with this topic and helping them to understand the meaning of some of the key vocabulary associated with it.
